

Great dance classes can be found locally and on You Tube. Redmond Area Park and Recreation District holds classes at the senior center in Redmond. Depending on your insurance you may even be able to participate for little to no cost. And an added bonus one of the instructors was in the final four of the Silver Sneakers® nationwide instructor of the year campaign. Line dancing and square dancing can also be found locally. Wildlife of the Month: Bobcat (*Lynx rufus*)



Some of our Crooked River Ranch neighbors get surprise visitors peering in their glass doors or perhaps inside their chicken coops helping themselves to breakfast! The bobcat is about twice the size of our domestic cats and easy to recognize by it's short "bobbed" tail. Bobcats are reclusive, live solitary lives and can be found throughout Oregon. They will rest and hide in large brush piles, hollow trees or under logs and jumbled rocks.

Breeding season for bobcats starts in February and after about 60 days, two to four kittens will be born. Kittens are fully furred and start to open their eyes in about 9 days. They are dependent on mom until around Autumn and start to establish their solitary independence at one year of age. Like all other felids, bobcats eat only meat and will hunt wood rats, squirrels, rabbits, mice and occasionally carrion. They are capable of killing fawns and will also forage for ground dwelling birds, such quail and grouse. Bobcats are mostly active morning and evenings but can appear on your deck any time of time day.

Bobcats can be hunted and trapped at designated times of the year, with a permit but must be reported to Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife. Beware of traps placed too close to walking trails and near the rivers. DO NOT FEED WILDLIFE OR YOU MAY FIND A BOBCAT IN YOUR BACK YARD!

There were 1,321 county wide calls made to Jefferson County Sheriff Department in the month of June. CRR actions and calls for service: 260.

Of a total of 64 incidents in the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department <u>Press Log</u> for the period June 5, 2023, through July 2, 2023, eight (8) involved Crooked River Ranch.

Ensure You Are Signed Up for Emergency Alerts, iPhone Automatic Crash Notifications

Wildfire season is ramping up around central Oregon. We encourage everyone to sign up for emergency alerts through both Jefferson and Deschutes Alerts regardless of which county you live in. These alerts will provide important information in the event of an evolving fire incident or evacuation need here on Crooked River Ranch. You can sign up by visiting our website at crrfire.org and clicking on "Citizen Emergency Alerts".

In June the Fire District ran fifty-one calls for service. This included four (4) fires, thirty-six (36) emergency medicals or rescues, five (5) service calls, and four (4) good intent calls. You can see our monthly call totals on our website at crrfire.org/2023-calls-for-service.

During early July the District responded to two unique emergency calls that were generated by Apple iPhone's new automatic crash notification feature. Per the Apple website, "Crash detection is designed to detect severe car crashes. When a severe car crash is detected the iPhone or Apple Watch sounds an alarm and displays an alert." If the user doesn't respond within twenty seconds of the alert, the phone automatically calls emergency services. In both instances our crews didn't find a car crash but did locate the iPhone that created the alert alongside the road. We presume the phones were left on the outside of the vehicle and fell off while driving down the road. The phones, which were intact after the ordeal, were turned over to the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office to be reunited with their owners. We want to remind everyone to double check that your phone isn't left on the outside of your car where it could fall and trigger an unintentional alert. Camping with Horses Tips from an Experienced Horse Camper

Merriam-Webster states Murphy's Law as "anything that can go wrong will go wrong." Keep this in mind if you have never taken your horse camping with you, but want to do so. Crooked River Ranch resident Becky Ruedi has three rules for camping with horses: 1. Prepare. 2. Prepare. 3. Prepare. And a few suggestions to go along with those rules. A veteran of horse camping since age 13, Becky and her husband, Dennis, have lived at CRR for over 27 years. She is well known in the horse community for her limitless knowledge of horses, including horse camping. In this article are Becky's suggestions to enjoy camping with your horse.

Born and raised in the valley, Becky was the only one of four children who loved horses. Because her family couldn't afford to feed a horse through winter, her dad would go to the horse auction in the spring, buy a horse and then Becky would ride it from spring until fall when her dad would sell it. Riding bareback, Becky hardly knew what a saddle was until age twelve when she moved in with her aunt and uncle who were true horse people. There she was able to live horses seven days a week year-round. She

would trail ride, show and take "real" riding lessons. They, too, would buy horses from the auction, train and show them until someone was interested in buying.

pack in, set up camp and then change to another camp every day.

At thirteen, Becky and her aunt, along with some others, horse camped during the summer for five to seven days at a time. They would

She learned from the best. Those were the days when she slept under a tarp and used ponchos to keep warm. This continued for twenty years until she started camping at a stationary camp and enjoying the daily rides from it. She states that her accommodations have definitely improved since her early horse camping days. Here are Becky's horse camping suggestions.

Camping with your horse opens a whole new world of experiences for the trail rider. Additionally, the dynamics of your relationship with your horse changes. Horse camping is not to be entered into lightly. Preparation for both you and your horse are imperative for both of you to enjoy the new activity. If you are already an experienced camper, you're better off than someone who has never camped, but adding a horse to the camp adds a new and different dimension to the camping experi-

Train your horse at home before you ever take it camping. Your horse will be tied for hours at camp. Teach it to tie for extended periods of time at home and to stand without pawing. Start slow. Tie your horse for a couple of

hours for a few days and then increase the length of time. Tie it to whatever you will tie to when camping (highline, trailer, high tie on horse trailer). If a horse is tied to the trailer, cover or block the trailer wheel wells and tires to prevent horses from getting a leg stuck or pawing the wheels. A sheet of plywood works well.

Think of the horse's comfort. Bring a blanket for the cold nights and a flysheet for the day. A cold, cranky horse can make for a crow hopper at the start of your ride. Take insect spray for both your horse and yourself. Be sure it repels flies, mosquitoes and ticks.

Be sure your horse knows how to drink from a bucket. Bring water from home in case your horse refuses the water at the camp location. Keep your horse hydrated. Im-

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



paction or colic are all too often a problem in horse camping, which can be stressful, particularly for horses not in shape for the rides and not consuming enough water. Always travel with banamine. A vet is rarely close. If at all possible, start horse camping with an experienced horse camper.

Study the area where you will be riding. Know how long the trails are and make sure your horse is in shape for the rides. Know the major roads. Your horse should be shod or have boots it is used to wearing. For you, wear comfortable boots. You never know when you might have to walk.

Items not to be overlooked: Bucket, PDZ (or other stall freshener) to keep horse urine from smelling, hay bag/net, first-aid kit for both horse and rider, map, GPS or map of the

area on your phone and certified weed-free hay or hay in pelleted form (required at most campgrounds).



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Neighbor Helping Neighbor Program

I have been asked over the last few years for more information about the Neighbor Helping Neighbor (NHN) Program and how it works. First and foremost, I would like to thank all of those that have contributed to the program. Without your generosity, this program would not be possible. It is so appreciated, and the recipients are very grateful.

First step is to apply. If you are in a financial situation where you struggle to pay your HOA dues, it might be worth your while. Once your application is received, your file is assigned a number. A face-to-face meeting is required in order for you to provide documentation and

having a discussion also brings out situations that are not visible on paper.

As in any assistance program, documentation must be provided to determine your eligibility. Ownership of the property and a resident of at least one year are the first qualifications. You must also not have any CC&R complaints filed against your property. We evaluate eligibility by looking at your debt-to-income ratio.

We require that you provide us with income statements, and debt statements. Income statements can include wage stubs, Social Security Award letters, food stamps, pension and retirement statements. Debt statements can include mortgage, property tax, utilities, car, insurance, medical, credit card and student

All this information is kept confidential and the only person to see this information is myself or any future NHN coordinator. Your privacy is of utmost importance.

Once your file is reviewed a recommendation is made and presented to a committee of Ranch owners. They only receive a small snapshot of information and my statement to support the recommendation. They do NOT see any personal information, not even your name. Once an approval is made, you will be notified of the amount and the remaining balance (if any) that you will be responsible for.

Payments are made directly to the HOA on your behalf. No money is paid to the applicant. You are allowed to apply each semi-annual dues period and documentation must be provided one time each twelvemonth period.

If you feel that this process is too intrusive, remember that the Ranch offers monthly payment plans that may make it a little easier on your wallet.

I'm always happy to answer any questions you may have about the program, so please feel free to reach out.



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


