Wildland fuels reduction work continues

Fire abatement and fuel reduction projects have always been a high priority on Crooked River Ranch. Given the geography of the peninsula and the limited possibilities for egress, fire safety is often uppermost in our thoughts. With support of the Board of Directors, careful planning by maintenance and fire district personnel and adequate funding, more highly concentrated fire abatement efforts were started in 2014.

That year, our local fire district made it possible for me to attend a Wildland Urban Interface class at the National Fire Academy in Maryland and I returned with the idea of helping make the ranch a fire adapted community. It wasn't difficult to convince the Ranch Manager and Board of Directors at that time how important this work is. Each year, areas are identified, prioritized, and scheduled for treatment. To create safety corridors in many areas around the ranch, we have treated hundreds of acres of common property; trees have been thinned and removed, and brush and weeds mowed. Most of the handwork has

been done by Wellspring Management Inc., headed by Tim Bell. Tim often acts as project manager, arranging and scheduling other contractors and workers who are brought in for projects requiring specialized forestry management equipment and hand crews. We hire crews of young people from the Heart of Oregon Corps as well. They wield chain saws and shovels to clear trees, brush, and ladder fuels.

The HOA Board and Budget Committee continue to support these efforts and have dedicated \$30,000 for fire abatement in next fiscal year's budget starting May 1st. Volunteer groups of interested residents, using their own equipment, and led by dedicated board members have worked to make the lower pastures between Chinook and Buffalo roads safer. They have removed boulders and thinned trees to make the pastures more accessible for mowing. I estimate we are several years away from becoming a truly Fire Adapted Community. This work will continue. Some of the areas we treated seven or eight years ago need follow

-up work and new areas are identified for treatment each year.

Opportunities for grant assistance have appeared and there are several applications pending. If some of these grants are approved, it would allow for the purchase of important and expensive equipment, and possibly the creation of a staff position dedicated to fire abatement. These are exciting prospects, but even without the assistance of grants, those of us who live on the ranch can do our part. We can review our property or seek assistance in having it evaluated for fire safety. We can create an emergency plan and prepare our homes and ourselves. Explore websites like www.fireadapted.org,

www.firesafe.org, and the Crooked River Ranch Fire Protection District's website at www.crrfire.org. Another good resource is the Central Oregon Intergovernmental Council. They have partnered with the Heart of Oregon Corps to form the Central Oregon Wildfire Workforce Partnership. Crooked River Ranch has signed on to this partnership and ranch residents can get information on this assistance at <https://coic.org/cowwp>.

We have chosen to live within the beauty of the Wildland Urban Interface, and we are working to preserve that space. Fuel reduction is a key element of that work, and I am happy to play a part in it and excited to see the results of our collective efforts.

Get ready for the Steel Stampede

Vintage motorcycles from all around the United States and beyond will soon roll into Crooked River Ranch for the highly anticipated Steel Stampede. The event will be held on May 6th and 7th with trials beginning at 10:00 am on Saturday and races starting at 9:00 am on Sunday. This year will mark the 15th year of the American Historical Racing Motorcycle Association (AHRMA) sanctioned event. The event has been held annually at Crooked River Ranch except for the two years it was cancelled during COVID.

When Pete Fisher, motorcycle enthusiast, event organizer and visionary started the Steel Stampede seventeen years ago, he had no idea it would become the largest event of its kind in the Northwest. Fisher is well versed in what makes a good course for vintage motorcycle trials and races. Throughout the years he has been involved with many cycling events both as an organizer and as a participant. He envisioned the Crooked River Canyon providing both a beautiful backdrop for spectators and a challenging course for riders. The venue has not failed to please. While being held in a rural setting, the location offers amenities including a convenience store, RV parks and hotels for participants.

All Steel Stampede events have been held for one purpose; to benefit the community. Proceeds from the initial event were earmarked for the Fire Hall with proceeds from subsequent events benefitting the community at large. Past projects, which were provided for the community with proceeds from the event, include the restrooms by Lions Memorial Park, the upper-level visitor's kiosk, Coyotes Den Disc Golf Course, bleachers, chips for the walking trail at Panorama Park, the bocce ball court and a new children's playground. Currently the Ranch Enhancement Committee reviews requests for funds for different projects with recent completed projects including Pickleball Court improvements, new fencing at MacPherson Park and by the Trading Post and rock work by the First Responders and Veterans memorial.






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May is Wildfire Awareness Month, Big News from the Oregon State Fire Marshal

In Oregon, May is designated as Wildfire Awareness Month. This May we encourage you to take some time to clean up around your home to give it a fighting chance during a wildfire. Create space between combustible landscaping and your home; a minimum of five feet is the recommended distance from a structure. Keep the area within 100 feet of your home or property line clean. Check your roof and gutters to make sure there is no debris collected there that can catch fire from an ember. Taking simple steps to prevent wildfire can make a difference in whether your home may survive a wildfire.

Outdoor debris burning season will be closing soon. An exact date has not been set as it will depend on the weather this month. Remember to call the Burn Information Line (541-923-4633) before doing any burning. Historically burning times go to restricted hours in the morning this time of year so don't be surprised if that changes soon. Check our website and watch social media for more information on when outdoor debris burning will close.

The annual Easter Egg Hunt was held on Saturday, April 8th. The Dick Chandler Ball Field, and surrounding areas, were covered in eggs for children to find. We are happy to report that this event was well attended, and the eggs were found very quickly. Thank you for joining us at the event.

Finally, this month some very big news from the Oregon State Fire Marshal's Office (OSFM). Crooked River Ranch Fire & Rescue was selected to receive a brand-new Wildland Interface Fire Engine through the OSFM Engine Grant Program. We are very excited to be chosen for this opportunity and look forward to taking delivery of the fire engine in early 2024. Keep an eye out on our website and social media page for future sneak peeks of the engine and more detailed information as we get it!





BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

March, 20 2023

- The meeting was called to order by President Vickery. All Directors were present except for Director Lowe.
- Ranch Manager LaPora shared the mockup of the new website which received positive feedback. May 17 is still the target date for completion and going live. She noted that Steel Stampede plans are moving along well. The poster was shared with the BOD.
- Vice President Erdekian gave an update of the Community Garden work noting two volunteer workdays with 40 people showing up. Planting goal is 3rd week in May. Shoutout made to Wellspring for their time and chipper equipment.
- Ranch Manger LaPora reported that the fire abatement work for this fiscal year is complete. A meeting is being planned to determine next year's fire abatement projects.
- Ranch Manager LaPora noted that two juvenile were seen doing the damage at Panorama Park with one juvenile being identified. The ranch has replaced the toilet paper dispensers and Jefferson County has set up a porta potty but has not completed their part of the repairs.
- Ranch Manager LaPora reported that repairs are almost complete on the duplex water damage. May Mays Creation has been able to move back in and as soon as a toilet is installed, Black Dog will be returning as well.
- Ranch Manager LaPora stated the credit card reader will be installed this week for the RV Park dump station and the back flow completed.
- Director Beveridge provided an update on the RV Park reservation system. Unanimous concern was expressed about the drop in revenue over the winter months. Suggestion for Brenda to focus getting the RV Park out on social media marketing with emphasis on winter rentals. The BOD made the decision to implement Reserve America until reservations are completely working. At this time reservations being made over the phone are approx. 15-20 daily.
- A motion was made and approved unanimously to approve AFE #285 in the amount of \$20,000 for cart path repairs to be performed by Preserving Pathways, LLC and the purchase of one pallet each of crack seal and cold patch materials.
- Ranch Manager LaPora provided a draft revision of the Policy & Procedure Manual and asked the BOD to read it and offer corrections along with any questions they may have.
- A motion passed to adopt Resolution 2023-04-16 which supersedes 2022-06-20-C was made and seconded with a vote of seven in favor and one opposed.
- President Vickery stated that PUC will be holding a zoom meeting on the rate increases on April 26th. She encouraged everyone who had questions or concerns about the increase to submit their questions and comments to the PUC via their website by April 23rd. She also suggested that the BOD, on behalf of the Association, submit questions and/or comments to the PUC as the increase will have a large financial impact on the HOA.
- Vice President Erdekian pointed out that Director Lowe has not attended one BOD meeting in over three months. As noted in the CRR By-Laws, the Board of Directors can deem a position vacant in the event a BOD member is absent from three consecutive regular meetings of the BOD. A motion to remove Director Lowe from the BOD was made by Vice President Erdekian and seconded by Director Sheryl Jones. It was a unanimous decision to unseat Daniel Lowe.
- Carol Orr, John Stevens, Kent Inman, Jennie Anderson, Michael Bruner, Birk Lowrie all spoke during Public Input.
- The meeting was adjourned at 8:45 p.m. by unanimous vote.

Winter's Story, Lessons learned about transporting equines

It had been a bitterly cold week with snow once more forecast on the night of February 9, 2021. My new horse, ironically named "Winter", was to arrive from Arkansas that night by a horse transportation company I used when I had mules shipped from the same Arkansas location. The mules arrived in good condition so I had no reason to be concerned until I received a phone call a week after Winter had been picked up. The call was from the owner of the transport company informing me Winter was thin and in poor condition. I questioned why I wasn't contacted when she was picked up. Without answering that question, he assured me Winter would make the trip "okay". I asked for pictures. He had taken none. The driver was new and claimed he picked her up from the seller in that condition. I immediately contacted the seller and he stated Winter was in excellent condition when picked up. I had numerous, recent videos of her at the seller's location and I believed him. The transport company and the seller blamed each other for the poor condition I was about to see. Winter's journey had taken longer than anticipated. What was expected to be a four to five day transport turned into almost two weeks. One excuse after another delayed delivery.

The night was black as the truck pulled up at 8:00 pm to our front gate and parked on the road. We had placed our pickups with headlights shining on the drive so we could see to unload her. We were prepared.... we thought. As Winter unloaded, we all gasped. We started taking pictures in disbelief. I quickly handed her to my friends, Tammy and Shan who, by truck headlights, immediately blanketed her in the cold night while I dealt with paperwork that needed to be completed. Hauling equines across state lines often requires a Coggins test and health certificate. With paperwork in order and transport paid, we got Winter settled into her new warm loafing shed and pasture. She was very thirsty. We limited her feed so as not to cause colic, a condition that can be fatal to equines. I knew, by

her condition, we were in for some health concerns.... little did I even know.

And so it began. Within a couple of days, we noticed Winter was not walking steadily on her front feet. I called my farrier (horseshoer) out right away. He confirmed her feet were in poor condition and she needed to be seen by our veterinarian. After the initial exam and x-rays, our biggest fear was confirmed. Winter had foundered and developed laminitis in her front feet. The coffin bones inside her hooves rotated from the correct position. Although I purchased Winter from Arkansas without seeing her in person, I had several videos of her walking, trotting and cantering. There was no indication of any foot issue. Founder can be caused by diet changes, insulin imbalances, illness, medications and stress in multiple forms, among other factors. In some cases, the founder is so severe the horse's coffin bone cannot be corrected and euthanasia is required. Winter was one of the lucky ones. With more vet visits involving more x-rays and our vet working with our farrier, they were able to slowly correct the position of the coffin bones by trimming her hooves in specific degrees.

Meanwhile, we started her on a plan to boost her weight and health. Her weight returned to normal in time, but it took many months for her front feet to be corrected. Six months after Winter arrived, my friend Carrie purchased her. Carrie's love, passion and knowledge for rehabilitating injured and lame horses is unwavering. She continued with the original plan to correct Winter's feet. It took a team of people to bring Winter to the point she is today; a beautiful horse that is now able to move freely without pain and is a joy to ride.

Winter's Story is written to bring awareness to others when considering a transportation company to have equines shipped. With the different genres of riding these days such as showing, barrel racing, roping, dressage, jumping, endurance riding and even backyard trail horse (just to name a few) and

with the assist of the internet in locating that perfect horse, shipping equines across state lines has become the norm. Sadly though, this can be detrimental to the horse if the shipper is rushed or uneducated about the horse's needs. It falls on the driver who is actually transporting the horse. Horses need layovers when hauling a long distance. Horses need to stretch their legs and eat and drink water often. The driver must be able to recognize the first signs of colic or illness, including dehydration and know how to administer medical aid in the event of an injury or colic. Having had several mules transported across the country, I have learned the best transporters and drivers were actual horsemen themselves who knew exactly what mules need for feed and when to stop and rest. Many drivers for equine transport companies are not familiar with equines and are on a tight schedule for delivery. When selecting a transport for your new equine, ask lots of questions: route, ETA, knowledge the driver has of equines, feed provided, layover days, planned rest stops and condition of the truck and trailer. Anything you can think of, ask! The transport company should be prepared for the change of road and weather conditions, keeping your horse's welfare the priority. Some transport companies have large box stalls for a horse to move freely during transportation and others will tie horses in a line in a stock trailer. Stay in touch with the driver or owner of the transport company while en route. Set up an agreed upon time to check in when the driver is stopped for the evening. Read as many reviews as you can on the transport companies. Private parties will transport your horse for you, as well. Ask the same questions and look for any reviews. Make sure all paperwork on your horse is in order (registration papers, health certificate and Coggins, if required) at the time the horse is being picked up.


Transportation can be stressful to your new horse, but it doesn't have to be. There are lots of great equine transporters. You need to find the best one for your new equine partner.

Of a total of 951 incidents in the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department Press Log for the period March 6, 2023, through April 2, 2023, sixteen (16) involved Crooked River Ranch.





RATING: Moderate, Drive rough road
 (8 miles) & Walk (4 miles)

Gray Butte offers an opportunity to see some wonderful middle elevation (3,000 to 4,000 feet) native wildflowers not found on the Deschutes and Crooked River canyon trails. This trail approaches from the old McCoin homestead and orchard on the north side of Gray Butte. It is reached by Forest Road 57 off Lone Pine Rd less than a quarter mile east of Lone Pine's intersection with Hwy 26. There is plenty of parking at the trailhead; however, the three-mile dirt road in and out is quite rough, so we will need to carpool in the most rugged vehicles. We will meet at the Rimrock Springs Wildlife Management Area at 9:00 am to arrange our carpool. See directions below.

Our wildflower hike itself will be moderate (due to some elevation gain), but we will only cover the first few trail miles out and back along the base of Gray Butte. We will stop often to learn about the native plants at 3,000 to 4,000 feet of elevation. You will have time to explore the McCoin orchard. There are no restroom facilities available at the trailhead. No pets allowed.

Wear sturdy hiking boots, dress in layers, bring water for the day and a sack lunch. Sunscreen, hat and trekking poles are advisable. Bring along your **Guide to the Native Plants of the Deschutes Canyon Area**. FANs new, expanded edition of the native plant guide is available at your local independent bookstore or at FANs website at fansofdeschutes.org (\$20/FANs members/\$15/non members). I will have books to sell if you need one.

This is a free hike, limited to 10 participants and **registration is required** and available at www.fansofdeschutes.org. If the hike is full, your name will be added to the waiting list and you will be contacted if an opening becomes available.

Directions: To make sure we can caravan safely on the rough dirt road to the trailhead, we will meet in the parking lot at Rim-

rock Springs on Hwy 26 between Prineville and Madras to carpool to the site. If you are coming from Crooked River Ranch, Sisters, or Redmond, turn off Hwy 97 in Terrebonne at NE Smith Rock Road. Continue past Smith Rock State Park and turn north on NW Lone Pine Road. Follow it until it merges into Highway 26. Turn left, and continue north on Highway 26. Watch for the sign to Rimrock Springs WMA on the right after you pass SE Ramms Road coming in from the left.

This easy, level hike will include stops to monitor eight bluebird boxes. We may see nests, eggs, baby birds, and some surprises! Families and children are encouraged to participate. Children that are interested can complete a scavenger hunt checklist to help them discover their surroundings while we hike.

We will meet at the end of the gravel section of Peninsula Road where there is a cattle grate and kiosk. We will hike in on Peninsula Drive along the Crooked River rim, leaving the road at times to walk short distances to check nest boxes. This road has some rocky, uneven terrain, but it is generally easy to walk.

Wear comfortable closed-toe shoes and comfortable hiking clothes with layers. Bring water and a snack. Bring binoculars if you have them. FANs will make available binoculars to anyone who does not have a pair. We will leave promptly at 7:30 a.m., so please be punctual.

Chimney Rock Hike

This four-hour hike will focus on native plants, including early summer wildflowers. The well-maintained trail takes us from the banks of the Crooked River to the geological marvel called Chimney Rock on the canyon rim. We will go slowly and stop often to examine the native wildflowers we encounter and enjoy the incredible vistas along the rim. We will be hiking through several native plant communities, including the talus slope and the lithosol on the canyon rim. After eating lunch, we will hike down and explore the riparian zone in the campground. This hike will start at the Chimney Rock trailhead located across the road from the Chimney Rock Campground on the Crooked River below Bowman Dam. Please be at the trailhead ready to start the hike at 9:00 am. No pets please.

Wear sturdy hiking boots, dress in layers, bring water for the day and a sack lunch. Sunscreen, hat and trekking poles are advisable. Bring along your **Guide to the Native Plants of the Deschutes Canyon Area**. FANs new, expanded edition of the native plant guide is available at your local independent bookstore or at FANs website at fansofdeschutes.org (\$20/FANs members/\$15/non-members). I will have books to sell at the trailhead if you need one.

This is a free hike, limited to 10 participants and registration is required and available at www.fansofdeschutes.org one month prior to the hike date. If the hike is full, add your name to the waiting list by contacting fansofdeschutes@gmail.com. It is not unusual for folks to cancel as the day of the hike approaches. We will contact you if space develops.

Immune system and diet

Summer isn't the usual time to think about boosting immunity to prevent colds and flu. Our diets strongly influence the functions of the immune system. Our immune system includes skin and mucous membranes that prevent harmful substances from entering our body. If invaders break through the first line of defense the immune system will go into rescue mode producing specialized blood cells and antibodies to attack the invaders.

The Mediterranean diet highly plant based, is one of the most immune supportive diets, balancing portions of eggs, dairy and seafood with limited red meat and sugar. Immune friendly nutrition from spices, vitamins and minerals are an easy assist. Plant based diets also have strong antioxidant and anti-inflammatory properties. Garlic helps regulate the immune system balance. Ginger acts

as an antioxidant and anti-inflammatory. Curcumin or turmeric has been found to assist in suppressing the production of molecules that increase inflammation. Vitamins are important to the immune system as deficiencies can suppress the immune system functions. Vitamin A regulates the immune system. Foods high in Vitamin A are: carrots, spinach, sweet potatoes, squash, mangos and apricots. Vitamin C stimulates immune function and is a powerful antioxidant. The highest concentrations are found in citrus fruits, kiwi, strawberries, tomatoes, white potatoes, broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower and Brussels sprouts. Vitamin E also stimulates the immune response and can lower infections in elderly. Include green leafy vegetables and dried fruits in your diet.

In the mineral department copper, iron, magnesium zinc and selenium are important in the functioning of the immune system. Consider adding; shellfish, nuts, mushrooms, tuna, salmon, legumes and wild rice. Consider making these small changes to your diet to give your immune system the boost it needs.

10. Please don't come in with a health condition that is contagious, infectious, or water transmitted.
11. The pool is not considered open if there is no attendant. Do not enter water before being told it is safe to do so. Chemicals may have been added recently.
12. Weather (wind chill, and rain) is an operational factor with an outdoor pool. If thunder or lightning is present, the pool area will be cleared until staff determines it is safe to return.
13. Pool may be closed for weather, health, safety, or other considerations.

Volcanic rocks of Central Oregon and their origins



"Volcanic Rocks of Central Oregon and Their Origins" will be presented by FANs Board member Al Albin. The presentation will take place on Saturday, May 20th from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. in the Juniper Room at Crooked River Ranch.

Volcanic activity is the dominant geologic agent shaping the Central Oregon landscape! We live on a thin piece of crust near the edge of an active continental margin. That activity is tectonics, pieces of earth's crust in motion.

This motion results in volcanic activity. Different types of crustal movements produce different types of volcanic rocks. Volcanic activity is very much in evidence with the Cascades to our west and lava flows exposed throughout the Deschutes Basin. Almost all the rocks in Central Oregon are volcanic or are directly derived from volcanic rocks.

Attendees will have the opportunity to examine a variety of rock samples and observe and compare their characteristics such as color, density, and texture. Each rock type will be discussed in terms of their composition and physical characteristics and how these characteristics relate to the tectonic environment that produced them.

Al Albin grew up in the Willamette Valley and always had an interest in geology. He moved to Eastern Oregon and worked at the John Day Fossil Beds. His experiences with the professionals that worked and studied there inspired him to study geology in earnest. Al received his Bachelor's Degree at Oregon State University and his Master's Degree at Northern Arizona University. He worked as an engineering geologist with the US Bureau of Reclamation and the Department of Agriculture. After retiring, he returned home, to Central Oregon where he leads geology hikes for FANs.
