Three Fire District Board of Director positions up for election

From the CRR F&R Board of Directors



Crooked River Ranch Fire & Rescue is seeking interested candidates for our Board of Directors. Currently, there are three positions that will be on the May 2023, ballot for election. If you would be interested in running for one of these positions, there will be a question-and-answer session at a special Board Workshop held at the fire station on Thursday, January 15th at 6:00 pm.

The fire district is governed by a five-member Board of Directors elected to serve by the people. Board members serve 4-year staggered terms. The Board of Directors is responsible for conducting the affairs of the District in compliance with Oregon Revised Statutes. The Board of Directors has the legislative authority and power to establish policies and procedures that are in the best interest of the residents it serves.

The Board ensures that the District achieves its mission in an ethical, transparent, accountable, and prudent manner. Each Board Member is responsible for the functions described below, all of which are accomplished at Board meetings and committee assignments through re-

view of information, strategic planning, conversation, and decision-making.

Board member's duties:

- Attend the monthly Board meetings. Special meetings or workshops can be scheduled as needed.
- Review and adopt the annual budget.
- Approve financial reports.
- Set goals and evaluate progress towards those goals.
- Ask voters to approve local option levies and bond measures for facilities and operations. Hire and evaluate the Fire Chief.
- Help set standards, controls, and policies that support sound risk management practices (e.g. safety & security, insurance, data controls, and personnel management practices).
- Connect with the community.

Together, the Board makes decisions and sets policies for the District. Individually, Board Members do not have any power, but by acting with fellow Board Members they have an opportunity to positively impact our community. Amateur Radio group meets at CRR, prepares for emergency situations

Probably one of the best kept secrets on the Ranch is the Crooked River Ranch Amateur Radio Group. A quick estimate reveals close to 80 licensed hams live here, while only a half dozen or so regularly show up at the on-air nets and meetings every month.

Of course, of these a percentage may be licensed but not operate. And others may operate, but have no desire to join any kind of club. But what of the rest?

This question came up recently at a CRR ARG meeting shortly after the Jefferson County 911 Call Center had gone down for a few hours, begging the question what would occur in the event of a real emergency, such as what might happen with the Cascadia Earthquake fault. Hams have been known to step up in emergencies like Hurricane Katrina and others when the internet, cell phones, and even electrical power were down.

"When All Else Fails" is a ham radio EMCOMM (Emergency Communications) motto. In fact, once a year in the summer, hams meet on the air for Field Day, a weekend when they set up in fields

and parks throughout the country on solar power and portable generators. Part contest and part EMCOMM training, they contact as many other stations as they can while honing their skills in operating during an emergency to coordinate delivery of vital supplies and care for the injured.

The CRR ARG meets on the air the first Wednesday of every month at 6:30 p.m. on the local radio repeater located at the fire station. The repeater is on a frequency of 147.060 MHz, + offset, with a tone of 162.2, and is easily accessible from just about anywhere on the Ranch and beyond with an HT (a Handy Talkie, a low power handheld transceiver). The monthly meetings are conducted in the meeting room at the CRR Fire Hall. Director Sean Hartley, AI7EQ, presents a variety of topics, from the latest communications technology, to antennas, contesting, EMCOMM, and even soldering, and more.

Dark Sky Initiative

Why is it important to preserve Oregon's dark skies and to diminish light pollution? Light pollution, caused by the use of excessive artificial light, can have many environmental consequences for humans, wildlife and even our climate. Central Oregon has a very large area that is considered one of the darkest in the country. Community awareness can maintain our dark skies with appropriate use of night time lighting.

Did you know:

1. Light pollution can disrupt our circadian rhythm and increase our risks for obesity, depression, sleep disorders, and more.
2. Light pollution is a huge energy waste. IDA estimates that about 30 percent of outdoor lighting is wasted due to lights that are not shielded.
3. Our dark sky has been a window to viewing our universe but the window is gradually closing due to light pollution.
4. Light pollution affects wildlife and ecosystems. Plants and animals depend on Earth's daily cycle of light and dark for reproduction, nourishment, sleep and protection from predators. Humans have dis-

rupted this cycle by lighting up the night. Numerous studies indicate negative and deadly effects on many creatures, including amphibians, birds, mammals, insects, and plants.

Join FANs for a presentation by Dr. Bill Kowalik PhD, Board Chair of the Oregon Chapter of the International Dark-Sky Association, who will show us how light pollution affects our world, and share his vision of how we can make a difference. The presentation will be held on January 21st from 4:00-6:00 p.m. in the Juniper Room at Crooked River Ranch.

Dr. Kowalik has a 35-year career as an earth scientist in research, development and exploration for minerals and petroleum, specializing in remote sensing, image processing, visualization and statistical techniques. As a volunteer, he has helped create several video documentaries: Saving Open Space, Living on the Urban Edge, The Story of La Habra Heights.

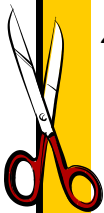

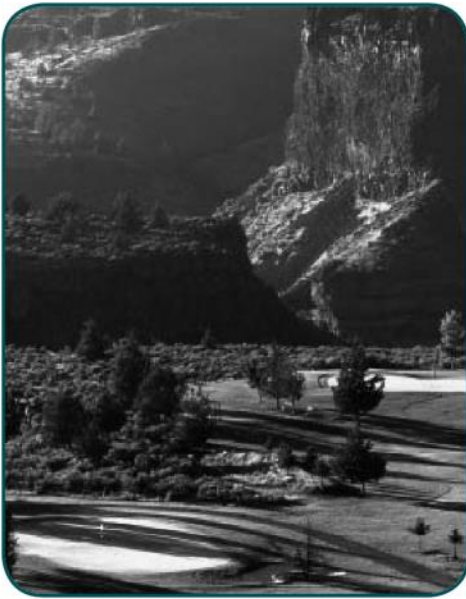

At the December Fire Board Meeting the Board of Directors appointed Sean Hartley as the new Fire Chief of Crooked River Ranch Fire & Rescue. Chief Hartley has been serving the Fire District since October 2008 and has held the role of Volunteer Firefighter, Volunteer Lieutenant, Captain/Administrative Assistant, and Assistant Chief. As a Captain and Assistant Chief his responsibilities included administration and acting as the chief financial officer for the District.

Before coming to Crooked River Ranch, Chief Hartley began in the fire service as an Explorer Scout with the Waldport Fire Department (now Central Coast Fire & Rescue) in 1997. In 2002 he came to central Oregon to attend Central Oregon Community College for his Associates Degrees in Fire Science and Emergency Medical Services. While attending college he was a Student at the Black Butte Ranch Fire District. In 2005 he graduated from COCC. After graduation he held positions at Crescent Fire District as a Firefighter/Paramedic and at Central Oregon Community College where he instructed both Emergency Medical Technician and Paramedic classes. During the summers while he worked at COCC he worked at the Yachats Fire District on the Oregon Coast.

Along with all the great tips we want to remind everyone that using a stove or oven to heat your house is not safe and can lead to fires or carbon monoxide poisoning.

Your Fire Board meetings are the third Thursday of each month at 6:30 PM at the Fire Station and the public is always welcome to attend in-person or virtually. Fire Safety during Winter Storms

Winter storms can happen almost anywhere. They can cause us problems. Know what to do before, during and after a storm. This will help keep you and your family safe from a winter fire.

- Test all smoke alarms. Do this at least once a month. This way you will know they are working. Install carbon monoxide alarms in your home. Test the alarms.
- Plan two ways out of the home in case of an emergency. Clear driveway and front walk of ice and snow. This will provide easy access to your home.
- Make sure your house number can be seen from the street. If you need help, firefighters will be able to find you.
- Be ready in case the power goes out. Have flashlights on hand. Also have battery-powered lighting and fresh batteries. Never use candles.
- Stay aware of winter weather. Listen to the television or radio for updates. Watch for bulletins online.
- Check on neighbors. Check on others who may need help.
- Generators should be used outdoors. Keep them away from windows and doors. Do not run a generator inside your garage, even if the door is open.
- Stay away from downed wires. Report any downed wires to authorities.
- Be ready if the heat stops working. Use extra layers of clothes and blankets to stay warm. If you use an emergency heat source, keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away.
- Turn portable heaters off when you leave the room. Turn them off when you go to bed.

IMPORTANT REMINDER

There are more home fires in winter than in any other season. Half of all home heating fires happen in December, January and February.

As you stay cozy and warm this winter season, be fire smart!

The next BAC meeting is scheduled for January 18, 2023, at 10:00am in the Juniper room, should you like to attend.

I am working on putting together a communication plan for various types of information and platforms that we can share to as well as provide access in other ways so that individuals on the ranch that may not have a computer, smartphone or may not be technology savvy and need additional assistance can also participate. I hope to have that in the near future, we will be sending out a survey via Survey Monkey to all those who have a registered email address with the Administration office to collect information from the community regarding the future plans for the lower pasture area. There have been a number of ideas talked about, but we would like to hear from you.

In closing, I would encourage you all to use this time of year to look at a way to incorporate something new and positive in your life. Whether it be learning something new, experiencing something new, or starting something new. Take this opportunity to bring new, positive, and exciting experiences into your life.

To Blanket or not to Blanket

This is the time of year when non-horse owners (and even some horse owners) ask why they see some horses with blankets and others without. Why? As a new horse owner a few years ago, I was curious about whether I should blanket my new horse. If you ask a variety of horse owners, you will get a variety of answers. Here is what I found. Yes. No. Maybe.

In general, healthy horses do not NEED to be blanketed. However, there are reasons to blanket. Long story short, it comes down to how a horse is used during winter months, personal preference of each owner, health issues and if horses have access to shelter. There are arguments on both sides of this issue and many of them are on the Internet, if you're interested in more details. A couple of recommendations are:

Horses grow winter coats to keep warm. Some owners use their horses intensely, working up a sweat, during winter months and don't want the horse to be too warm when being worked and not able to cool. This can include endurance riding or hard trail riding, race horses (not too many of those in Central Ore-

gon) and jumpers or performance horses such as barrel racers or those working cows. Therefore owners keep them blanketed during cold weather to inhibit the natural growth of the winter coat.

There are horse owners who show their horses year-round. This means they want the horse looking as sleek as possible so as to present itself in its utmost beauty. To accomplish that, the horse is blanketed through winter (and sometimes even summer). The show horse may not exercise much, but the owner wants the glossy look.

Then there is the consideration of the health of the horse. As horses age, they may not be able to keep themselves warm enough in winter, particularly at night. The owner helps them by adding a blanket to insulate their heat. Likewise, horses in poor health may need a blanket to keep them from expending energy to keep warm.

Some riders determine a temperature at which they decide they need to blanket their horses. It ranges. Some people say when it's in the teens they blanket, some aim for single digits. It is personal preference. Other riders say horse owners blanket their horses because they, themselves are cold, but humans and horses have different body temperatures and ways to acclimate to cold.

Whatever an owner's reason is for blanketing, once a horse is

blanketed, a commitment has been made and an owner needs to know the complexities of blanketing; what weight, wet blankets, frozen blankets, cleaning blankets, blankets that cause sores, when to blanket and when to remove, among others.

Many horse owners do not blanket. They generally keep food available to their horses 24/7. Fuel means warmth to a horse. Horses keep those calories coming in to stay warm.

Lastly, here's a little "gee-whiz" fact: Did you know horses grow their winter coat with the change of daylight, NOT with the temperature? As hours of daylight decrease starting in June, the horse's coat is making changes for the coming cold of winter. Conversely, as the hours of daylight increase starting in December, the horse's coat is getting ready for spring's warmer weather. Personally, I have a horse that begins shedding early in January!

Wildlife of the Month.....

Northern River Otters

Our local native otters can often be seen frolicking in the Deschutes and Crooked Rivers. Otters are part of the Mustelid family along with weasels, martins and minks. While fish make up a large part of an otter's diet, they also forage aquatic insects, crayfish and waterfowl. Evidence of their recent meals can be found in their "spraint.". Yes, you guessed correctly, scat or droppings which can be found around a communal area where otters gather to socialize and sleep.

Otter females generally give birth to as many as four pups in mid Spring. She nurtures her young without any help from the males. With a healthy population of otters, females may raise pups together in "holts," which are a system of burrows in the river bank with many entrances.

Since otters do not have a thick layer of fat to keep warm, they rely on a dense layer of fur to insulate their bodies. They groom this luxurious fur to keep clean and maintain warmth. Otters rely on healthy clean rivers for an abundant source of food to raise their pups.

When you are walking along our beautiful rivers, pause, quietly relax and perhaps you will be rewarded with the entertaining play antics of an otter with her pups on the opposite bank!

DON'T FEED DEER AND ELK



Well-intentioned people often feed deer, elk and other wildlife without realizing the problems feeding can create:

- Artificial feeding concentrates wildlife, which leads to the easier spread of disease and parasites and easier take by predators.
- Feeding deer and elk attracts their natural predators like cougars and coyotes to areas of human activity.
- Once wildlife associate people with giving them food, they come to expect it. Feeding will invite more deer and elk to your property and encourage them to stay.
- Artificial feeding can cause deer and elk to become habituated to humans and aggressive towards them.
- Concentrating deer and elk in human-settled areas can lead to an increase in vehicle collisions and conflicts between wildlife and pets.
- Concentrating deer and elk can hurt habitat by encouraging excessive grazing.

Every year, ODFW also sees seemingly healthy deer and elk die because they have been fed the wrong food by well-intentioned people. Their diet requirements actually change with the seasons and are best met by native forage. Deliberately feeding deer or elk may inhibit digestion and lead to death by starvation or infection.

ODFW does feed deer and elk at several wildlife areas during the winter, to keep them off adjacent agricultural lands where they damage crops. These feeding programs are long-term commitments that require significant financial and staffing resources. Feeding starts early in the season so deer and elk's digestive systems do not have to quickly readjust to new food types, and continues every day, no matter what, until forage conditions improve. Feeding areas are located away from human-populated areas to decrease conflicts. ODFW also conducts disease testing at some feeding sites.

Working together to maintain our roads...

Did you know that we have approximately 90 miles of roads on Crooked River Ranch. Out of the 90 miles of roads, 12 are County roads and 78 are Association roads. Of the 78 miles of Association roads, just over 26 miles are paved. All county roads are paved.

There are things we can all do to maintain and protect our roads. With winter around the corner, let's take a minute to think about ways to keep our roads passable and in good condition during inclement weather.

SLOW DOWN! Speed increases wash-boarding and unnatural erosion of our roads.

Do not abandon vehicles during inclement weather. Our equipment cannot effectively work around abandoned vehicles. When vehicles are left on the side of the road or blocking the entrance of a road or cul-de-sac, you are making it difficult, if not impossible, for the Road Department to plow.

Limit jack-rabbit starts and hard braking. This too damages our roads.

Remember that your Road Department is doing the best they can to keep your roads safe and drivable. With the vast number of road miles, your help is much appreciated. Be a good neighbor. Help where you can. Those who help by plowing cluster box areas and cul-de-sacs free our Road Department up to focus on the primary and secondary roads. Thank you to those who lend a hand. PLEASE SLOW DOWN!



Horses are high-flight prey animals. They are NOT big dogs!

If you encounter a horse on roads or trails, please adhere to the following for your safety and the safety of rider/horse:

- * If you're driving on a road and you encounter horses, please slow down. A horse can bolt sideways at 45mph and most often are frightened INTO the road.
- * If you're walking, biking, or running on a trail, please stop, speak to the rider and ask how they would prefer you proceed. Horses legally have right of way on most trails.
- * If you have children with you and you encounter a horse, please be sure your children remain still. Talking to the rider as they approach will help their horse understand you're no threat.
- * If you approach from behind, please communicate your presence as soon as you're able. Horses are much more likely to become fearful if you are suddenly running or riding up to their hind end. And always keep a healthy distance when passing behind or to the side of a horse, for your own safety.
